Two different programs for middle school girls, involving science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) will be the focus of our Sept. 12th meeting, which begins at 10 a.m. at the Bellingham YWCA, 1026 N. Forest St..

Special guests will be several of the eight young women sponsored by our branch who attended AAUW's Tech Trek science camp in July, at Pacific Lutheran University. Their families as well as teachers and counselors from the four Bellingham middle schools they represent have also been invited to the meeting. The young women will talk about their experiences at Tech Trek Camp and how the experience has influenced their interest in STEM.

Our featured speaker, Software Developer Sydney Cole, will speak about "Robotics for Middle School Girls in the Bellingham Public Schools." Cole is founder of Creators and Innovators Club for Girls, an after-school robotics program which began last year at Kulshan Middle School. *(continued on Page 2)*

In Memoriam

Two Bellingham Branch members have passed away recently. **Emma Conlee** died on August 9, 2015. She was 93. Also 93 when she passed on August 21 was **Joanne MacKay**.

Emma was graduated from Bellingham High School in 1940, attended Western Washington University for a time, and later returned to complete her undergraduate degree in 1957. She was a teacher, mostly of third grade, in the Bellingham Public Schools for nearly 40 years. She is survived by her daughter Carol Conlee Caughey (Donald) of Portland, Oregon, as well as grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She was co-president of Bellingham Branch of AAUW from 1995 through 1997 and was active in several community organizations such as Whatcom Museum, St. James Presbyterian Church, Whatcom County Democrats and League of Women Voters.

A celebration of her life will be held at the Fellowship Hall of St. James Presbyterian Church in Bellingham on Saturday, September 19, at 4:00 pm. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to the Emma Conlee Scholarship at Western Washington University Foundation, 516 High Street, Bellingham, WA 98225.

Joanne, a longtime Bellingham resident, passed away on August 21st. She is survived by her son David and his wife Aileen of Bellingham, Barbara and Yogendra Gupta of Pullman, and Douglas and Mary MacKay of Edmonds, and six grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband, William MacKay.

She was graduated from Duke University in 1943 with a major in Economics and a minor in Psychology. According to information from *The Bellingham Herald*, she studied engineering at the University of Texas at Austin and then worked for Curtis-Wright Aircraft Company in St. Louis, where she designed windows for the C-46 aircraft until the end of World War II. She and her family moved to Bellingham in 1961, where she was active in Bellingham Branch of the American Association of University Women and served as Program Director and cookie chair for Bellingham Girl Scouts. Joanne helped establish the Bellingham Day Care Center (now Bellingham Care and Learning Center). Following her career in education, Joanne owned and operated Tony's Coffee Shop in Fairhaven from 1977 to 1987.
