WELA member brings compelling information to November meeting

Could this be our next branch project?

The most memorable and poignant part of our November program on early learning was a short video of an experiment done with a baby and his mother: At first, the video showed the mom and baby looking at each other and interacting - if the baby cooed, Mom praised him. If he reached for her, she took his hand. Then, the experimenters had mom keep a neutral face, and not respond at all to the baby's actions. In no time, the baby became distressed, looked away from his mother, and finally, cried.

Just that simple video clip showed how important early interaction is for a baby.

lessica Sankey, a health and early education consultant who works with WELA (Whatcom Early Learning Alliance) had many other telling charts and studies to stress how important it is for all children to have adequate parenting and educational support. She noted that about 400 children are born in Whatcom County each year who may not receive the individual attention and nurturing that they need. She also pointed out that 90% of the babies

born in the county are born at St. Joseph's Hospital. What is needed, the audience came to understand, is a way to offer support to any family that seems at risk.

Is a volunteer task force to provide a comprehesive continuum of teaching and learning throughout the early childhood, something we can do? Can we get a conversation going?


