Earlier today I received an emailed letter from Lisa Maatz, AAUW Vice President of Government Relations. It evidently went to all AAUW members who utilize the Action Network, the automated system that lets us send letters to our legislators regarding public policy issues in which AAUW has an interest. The letter began:

"As 2013 draws to a close, we take a moment to thank you, our AAUW Action Network members, for your outstanding efforts to advance our shared mission. Your advocacy and financial support have helped AAUW influence public policy and implement successful and exciting grassroots advocacy efforts throughout 2013."

Attached to the letter is a long, exhaustive list of issues where AAUW has had an important part. Just a few: "AAUW helped lead the fight for passage of the <u>Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)</u>. AAUW members played a significant role by personally visiting congressional offices and sending thousands of messages to Congress. Without AAUW, campus sexual assault measures would have been overlooked in the legislation that became law.

"Because of AAUW members' stalwart advocacy for pay equity, AAUW was invited to stand with President Barack Obama at the White House ceremony commemorating the <u>50th</u> anniversary of the Equal Pay Act.

As state lawmakers and courts threatened to roll back voting rights protections, AAUW members across the country mobilized at colleges, community events, and other public spaces to register people to vote during <u>National Voter Registration Day 2013</u>".

This reminds us that each voice does count. I hope you will begin - or continue - to use the AAUW Action Network to make your thoughts known. We have work to do at the local level to fund the scholarships we give, and to advocate for equity, but we can also look beyond the county line to affect the national discourse.
