The Paycheck Fairness Act now being discussed in Washington D.C. would provide an update to the Equal Pay Act of 1963, bringing the law's principles and practices in line with the nation's other civil rights laws. The Paycheck Fairness Act helps to create incentives for employers to follow the law, empowers women to negotiate for equal pay, and



AAUW tour of museum exhibit draws large turnout

Over 30 members and guests attended our January Branch meeting at the Lightcatcher Museum. Members were eager to see the final product of Curator Babara Matilsky, who spoke to us 18 months ago about her plans and vision for the exhibit.

Michael Upchurch, writing a review of the exhibit for The Seattle Times, said, "the biggest impression you come away with is of an important exhibit that needs national exposure."

Just as Dr. Matilsky had told us of her plan, original artworks were complemented with topnotch reproductions, since the cost of borrowing a large amount of artwork, shipping and insuring it, would have been prohibitively expensive for our small museum.

Short videos and prints in old books round out the displays. If you haven't seen the exhibit, or want to go again, it will be shown through March 16.0

Upcoming Pay Equity program is brainchild of Catherine Chambers

When I asked Catherine Chambers what her ideal job would be, she paused for just a second, and then said, "I think I have it now."

She went on to say that she is content with where she is, her job, and her other activities, which center on her passion for women's issues and poverty.

Catherine works through Lydia Place, one of the local women's shelter organizations, to find housing for people who need it, and then help them maintain their housing. She explains that her clients range from whole families to single adults, and sometimes she also makes youth referrals. Much of the work is done under the umbrella of the Opportunity Council, with funds coming federal, state and local sources.

She is a member of the Community Development Advisory Board, and is active in state and local Democratic Women's groups.

Getting started with pay equity

Catherine says that spearheading the effort to hold a local panel discussion on



paycheck equity for women brings to fruition something that started back in the 1980's. It was at that time that she was involved with the issue of "comparable worth," and Washington State was sued by its employees to correct gender-based inequities. A settlement was reached in which the state agreed to pay over \$480 million to 34,000 state employees.

However, the issue seemed to die on the vine after that settlement, and today in Washington State the typical woman makes only 76 percent of what a typical man makes. Nationwide, the women's-to-men's earnings ratio is at a slightly more equitable level of 80.9 percent. (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics)

Catherine is eager to put the spotlight back on the pay issue, in hopes that local support will help our legislators win approval for the Paycheck Fairness Act, which is currently before Congress. She hopes that attendees at the AAUW Panel Discussion on Pay Equity will bring written accounts of their own battles for fair pay, as well as questions for the panel members, who include U.S. Rep. Suzan DelBene; Tonna Kutner, Seattle AAUW expert on Pay Equity, and Professor Shurla Thibou, Western Washington University Women's Studies Program. (cont. on page 5)

She then attended Western Washington University for a degree in visual communications, and later returned to Fairhaven College to earn a degree in community development.

She has three children and one grandchild. Her oldest daughter is trained as an ESL teacher. She and Catherine's son live in Bellingham, while her other daughter is studying at Portland Community College.

As well as being part of AAUW and Whatcom County Democrats, Catherine works for International Women's Day, the annual Martin Luther King poverty action march, and the free community breakfast.

A recent addition to her activities is doing a presentation on Eleanor Roosevelt. Catherine does not claim to be an actress, and does not try to duplicate Roosevelt's accent or looks, but she did sew herself a 1940's-style dress, and tries to speak as Roosevelt did. Her next presentation is to the Clark County Museum, in Vancouver, WA.

She also knits, enjoys music and theater, and hosts a Chinese foreign exchange student. 🗪
