moving the molten glass in and out of the furnace. Then, SMASH!! on one of its last trips into the fire, the vase breaks free and falls to the concrete floor.

This is where the lesson comes in: Morrison, without missing a beat, reconnects the largest shard of glass to the rod, and thrusts it into the furnace. What would have been a perfectly rounded vase becomes a free-form art piece, reshaped with the heat and a few deft maneuvers with shaping tools. So the lemon becomes lemonade, and no tears are shed over spilt glass.

> Another little lesson: a shard of the hot glass that had been redorange in color quickly cools to a blue and green striped pattern. When placed on the cool steel table, the shard spits tiny bits of glass into the air. This is why a finished piece is always moved quickly to a hot oven where it cools slowly over many hours.

> Morrison has about 18 Western Washington University students who study glassblowing with him as an elective.

After the demonstration, members shopped, mulled over which cookies to choose in our annual cookie exchange, and sang Christmas carols, led by member Robin Kagan. (See one more photo, Page 6.)

One of those benefits is building friendships through AAUW. Come to our meetings, learn something from our programs, visit with other members, and join in on some of our projects. Before you know it, there will be the "Elect Her" program on Western's campus, our Branch elections will be upon us, then High School Scholars Day, and possibly a fund-raising event. We can be proud of our accomplishments last year....sending seven girls to Tech Trek, supporting Girls Go Tech at Whatcom Community College, holding our wine-tasting and greenery sale fundraisers, and giving scholarships at all four local colleges. Nationally, AAUW has much to be proud of also. Here is a little excerpt from the AAUW Action Network — and this is just a small sample:

- Over 250,000 emails were sent by Action Network members to their legislators, both statewide and nationally. Your online advocacy efforts amplified AAUW's voice far and wide and across the nation. Each Thursday, when the AAUW Action Fund's Lobby Corps hits Capitol Hill, they are able to show members of Congress how many of their constituents are AAUW activists. Our Action Network was a critical force in furthering our public policy priorities in the states and in Congress in 2015!
- **AAUW Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps made over 1,300 visits to senators** and members of Congress on issues important to women and families. Lobby Corps members were toasted by U.S. House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi and Sen. Mazie Hirono (D-HI) in recognition of the corps' 40 years of citizen lobbying.
- New Title IX coordinator materials were released this year! After several years of advocating, AAUW realized a huge victory when the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights published the first-ever official tools for Title IX coordinators. These free resources, including a guidance letter and manual, reinforce the authority of Title IX coordinators and supports their work. AAUW was specifically mentioned in press, from Politico to Huffington Post and Inside Higher Ed.

It is easy to push the Action Network emails aside, but as you can see, our responses to them can - and do — affect national policy. Our strength is in our numbers - not to mention our common sense!
