"Women as Political Change Agents" is topic for community discussion

In partnership with Humanities Washington, the American Association of University Women--Bellingham Branch (AAUW) and the League of Women Voters® of Bellingham/Whatcom County hosted a community discussion, "Women as Political Change Agents: From the Late 1800s to Present" on April 9 at the Bellingham Public Library.

Speaking was King County Councilwoman Jean Kohl-Welles, who is a former state senator and a member of the Humanities Washington Speakers Bureau.

Dr Kohl-Welles reminded us that one of the first two women elected as Washington State Representatives was a Bellingham woman, Frances Axtell, who served from 1913 to 1915. Her issues were a minimum wage, public safety, and mothers' pensions.

One chart to ponder: The number of women in each state's legislature. Washington and many of the western states are in the top 10, while many in the bottom 10 are southern states.
