On November 8, WELA members will discuss the importance of making sure all young children in the community get the support they need for early learning. They will present more education and health data about local children and families, and describe exciting new initiatives designed to fill the opportunity gap many children experience.

The program has been organized by Jessica Sankey, a health and early education consultant who works with WELA.

The meeting begins at 10 a.m. November 8 at the Bellingham YWCA. 1026 N. Forest St. Members whose last names begin with M through Z are asked to bring a snack to go with coffee and tea, which will be provided.

books, and some create "legacy letters," which focus on philosophy of life more than events.

Many members said they knew they should preserve their history for future generations, but few had actually begun the process. Everyone listened

"No one else knows the stories of your life like you do, and only you can reflect on the wisdom gained and lessons learned during the journey."

This is one of ten reasons Sara Geballe gave members of AAUW - Bellingham Branch for writing one's memoirs.

Sara, a professional writer and creator of a local service called Memoir Crafters, spoke at the October general meeting. She brought several examples of different finished products, which can include scans of photos and mementos. Using samples from old letters, for example, can both tell a story and preserve the actual handwriting of a family member. Some people create complete

attentively as Sara described her process for helping clients construct their memoirs. She stressed that each person has a unique situation. She usually begins by taping several hours of interviews with each person, but some people just need help with organizing papers they already have.

To get the creative juices flowing, Sara gave everyone the task of writing about one or two memories, and trying to use all five senses, as well as feelings, to describe the topic.

Will someone take up the project of writing their personal history? Perhaps next year, we'll be hearing a member read from her memoir!

Our scholarship recipient at Whatcom Community College is Lindsev Helms. She wrote: "The decision to return to school after several years of working to study nursing is one that I am so happy that I made. However, the financial burden of leaving a steady job to start a new career is sometimes scary and stressful. This scholarship will truly make this process easier and less overwhelming."

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
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December meeting set
