Fifty girls from all over Washington gathered during the week of July 21 – 27th for the Tech Trek program. It has been found that it is important to encourage young women to stay enrolled in the so-called harder courses in high school. It was so successful that next year AAUW-WA is considering doing two camps, one for each side of the state.

Four Bellingham 7th graders attended Tech Trek, a week long Camp at Pacific Lutheran University.

Kimberly Keay came to our meeting to thank us personally. She was very grateful for the opportunity to learn. All the mothers that I spoke to after the camp said the girls were very excited and talked non-stop about their experiences.

To prepare for next year, we need a committee to invite students, interview them and decide on the ones to receive our sponsorship. We will also need letter writers to ask scientific businesses in the Bellingham area to sponsor a student. This year Pam Sankey, Lila Brumback and I headed up this project, working with the schools to identify candidates..

This was the first year for Tech Trek in Washington State. Cost to send each camper was \$1000. One of our Bellingham campers was sponsored with money from Ritzville Branch, which did not have a candidate to send.

125 years of Fellowships

To emphasize the importance and history of our scholarships, Susan showed us the video from the "Celebration of 125 years for Fellowships and Grants."

Among the many women who used the funds wisely were Madame Marie Curie, twice the recipient of a Nobel Prize; writer, professor and filmmaker Susan Sontag; psychologist Joyce Brothers, and several women who became the first women presidents of various universities. Judith Resnick, the second female astronaut, was an AAUW Fellow. Rachel Carson was an awardee and used the money for her book, *The Silent Spring*. (Go to AAUW on YOU Tube to see this short video.)

Transfer member is finding a new career in retirement



You've heard of people who are "glass half full" instead of "glass half empty." And you've heard of people who turn lemons into lemonade. One of our new Bellingham Branch members goes it one better: her glass is full of lemonade! She has a way of turning some of life's setbacks into plusses.

Born and raised in San Francisco, Jean Cox-Treverton moved with her family to San Rafael, in Marin County, CA, when she was nine. As a child, she loved to play with paper and scissors, paints, rubber stamps and paper dolls. She says she was never good at drawing, but loved to cut and paste.

As Jean grew up, she decided she wanted to teach, and got her degree in American Studies, a multidisciplinary major that included sociology, history and English. She minored in anthropology. But: she graduated at a time when there were no teaching jobs available. So, she went to work for a title company, working as a title officer and escrow officer for 25 years.

Then, she was offered a job training employees to use a new software developed for the title insurance business. This was a form of teaching, and she did that for 13 years, getting to the point where she was training other trainers.

The training job kept her on the road, sometimes as much as 40 weeks a year. One day, she happened to run across some rubber stamps by artist Mary Engelbreit. She used them to create a little book for a friend, and that was the rebirth of her passion for paper crafts. Over time, she learned new techniques from the Internet, and refined her work.

Eventually, a series of corporate mergers left her without a job. But instead of looking for work, she looked into retirement, found out she could do it, and moved to Bellingham. She lives with her dog Gwynne in a house that she is decorating with a French flair. With an eye for the interactions of color and pattern, she is creating what is obviously the home of an artist.
