Networking meeting held at WWU

Nine Bellingham Branch members (including Western liaison Rebecca Bunn, Ph.D.) attended a joint meeting with members of the Karen W. Morse Institute for Leadership (KWMIL) on March 3. Held in the Solarium in Old Main, the meeting was an exploration of ways AAUW and KWMIL can support career development for early faculty, women, and underrepresented groups on the WWU campus. Among the graduate students attending was Faythe Duran, who spoke at our September meeting.



Grad students at the networking meeting were Faythe Duran, Shannon Call and Christina Villalobos.

The grad students all spoke about a desire for mentorship and more information about the variety of jobs available to them once they get their degrees and move into the workforce. Karen Stout, Ph.D., Bowman Distinguished Professor of Leadership and Director of the KWMIL, noted that a virtual mentorship network, to be called Chronus, is already being planned, and could be extended to the graduate student level.

AAUW members told the group about our Start Smart and Elect Her programs, as well as THE National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) and AAUW scholarships.

Another idea that was well received was an orientation to the community for new faculty at WWU, Bellingham Technical College, Whatcom Community College and Northwest Indian College.

The assembled women agreed to plan more network meetings, and further some of the ideas discussed.

Dr. Bunn, Associate Professor in Environmental Sciences, and Dr. Stout chaired the meeting.

Other AAUW members attending were President Susan Moen, Cathie Oberg, Catherine Chambers, Elsie Heinrick, Carol Simmer, Jean Cox-Treverton, Judith Entwife and Gwen Parker.

Marian Leese Boylan (1926 - 2017)

A long-time AAUW member and a tremendous role model for women, Marian Boylan, age 90, passed away February 26, 2017 in Bellingham. Born in Oakland, CA to Alexander and Vera Leese, she graduated from the University of Washington in 1948. She was the widow of Professor Bernard Boylan, They were married on Sept. 1, 1950, and moved to Columbia, Missouri, where Marian worked as a journalist and her husband attended graduate school. They moved to Bellingham in 1956 where Marian worked for 27 years at KVOS-TV as a writer and in management. Following her husband's death in 1985, she returned to school and received an M.A. degree in English from Western Washington University. She then taught English in Changchun, Manchuria in 1988 and 1989 and in Beijing in 1992 and 1993.

Marian was chair of Bellingham's first Art Commission and on the Foundation board of directors of the Whatcom Museum of History and Art.

In November, 2013, Marian was honored at a reception in the Western Washington University Art Gallery, for her donation of a major trove of 20th century art collected by her parents. Until its unveiling at the event in her honor, Marian had no idea she would be presented with a catalog of the art works she had donated to Western. In the presence of about 50 quests, Marian received the first copy of the catalog from Western Gallery Director Sarah Clark-Langager, Ph.D., who was instrumental in producing the catalog and in planning the launch event in Marian's honor.


A strong supporter of university education for women, Marian was a lifelong member of the American Association of University Women and president of the Bellingham Branch from 1975 to 1977. For a number of years she was active on the Washington State board of AAUW and a member of the Association's national board of directors and its Foundation. In 1985, the state AAUW honored her as a recipient of a grant endowment from the national organization. In 1980, she was elected to a five-year term on the Washington Commission for the Humanities and was its president in 1984.
