Local attorney tells cautionary tales



Guest speaker at Bellingham AAUW's April business meeting was, appropriately, an attorney. **Emily Rose Mowrey**, owner of local law firm Limitless Law PLLC, left us with a powerful message about how important it is to have all your ducks in a row when it comes to your financial matters, especially wills and trusts.

Emily made these points, along with many others:

- It is important to revisit any trusts you may set up, if you move to a different state, because state laws vary greatly.
- How probate is handled varies from one state to another, with some much easier to work with.
- It is important to be sure beneficiaries on your investments are kept up to date. (For example, your evil ex could inherit a lot if you don't make needed changes.)

Emily is a Whatcom County native. A graduate of Whitman College, she studied law through the Washington State Bar Association Law Clerk Program, a four-year legal clerkship and law school curriculum administered by the Washington State Bar Association. She was chosen the Whatcom/Bellingham Chamber of Commerce Young Professional of the Year in 2015. She is also a member of Bellingham Roller Betties, and an adjunct professor at Whatcom Community College.

Annual Branch business meeting

Election of officers and a review of projects and budget were carried out at the annual business meeting. This is usually held in March, but was delayed one month because of the Centennial fashion show

There is very little change in the Executive Board after elections.

Heléne Berg-Kolin remains as our treasurer; Susan Moen continues another year as membership chair, joined by Robin Kagan for a two-year term. Robin was formerly a program co-chair. That position is now held solely by Catherine Chambers. (Also stepping down as a program co-chair is Jo Pullen.)

New officers will be installed in June.

Interesting data from our budget:

We raise money through individual and corporate gifts—and a whopping \$11 per year from your dues. (The remainder goes to our state and national organizations.)

To date this centennial year, we've raised more than \$17,000.

- Every donation of \$250 or more is acknowledged on our Path Forward listing.
- That money is given to support education and equity for local girls and women.

We've given about \$13,000 so far this year:

- \$7000 to send middle school girls to Tech Trek camp
- \$ 500 to support WCC's Girls Go Tech day camp
- \$1500 to recognize our local High School Scholars
- \$4000 in scholarships to our local colleges

We also use our resources on events that further support girls and women:

- Film festivals (Human Rights and Cascadia)
- January's March for Women's Rights
- February's Student Walk-Out
- March for Our Lives.

National Bylaws changes - *Please Vote!*

Voting closes on **Saturday, June 9, at 9 p.m. ET**. Results will be announced on **Sunday, June 10**, on AAUW's website. Watch your email for a notice.

Voting is now open on three National AAUW Bylaws proposals. Probably the most controversial is Proposal 3: *Shall the AAUW Bylaws be amended to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW?*

AAUW's Outlook magazine says this: “Both the Governance Committee and Board of Directors recognize the struggle and pride of many members in obtaining their degrees and understand some members fervently support maintaining the degree requirement as an honor to those efforts...However... AAUW recognizes the power of welcoming anyone who supports our mission...**AAUW cannot promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements.**”

Response to Bylaw Amendment on Degree Requirement

Recognizing the importance of expanding the national membership, I would rather have the membership requirements expanded rather than see the degree requirement eliminated altogether. I have many friends and acquaintances who are not eligible under the current membership requirements. If AAUW considered opening membership to those who had technical degrees or certificates and/or professional affiliations it would be possible to maintain the degree requirement as it now exists but allow membership to like-minded others. There are many persons inside and outside AAUW who are actively working to pursue the education and equity goals of the organization. Expanding membership outside the degree requirement could increase the power of our outreach and action to achieve those goals.

My objection to the amendment as it is now written: For all of us who have worked to earn that (those) degrees, our achievements would become meaningless in terms of membership in the national organization. After all, our membership has been based on those achievements, and to our dedication to making similar achievements available to wider and wider populations. I believe we can open membership to potential members without, in the first place, eliminating the historical and defining reason for our continued membership.

Girls Go Tech

In addition to helping local women to get a university education, and middle school girls to Attend AAUW's Tech Trek program, our local branch enables local teen girls to explore subjects in the STEM field. In April each year, AAUW Bellingham assists WCC to present Girls Go Tech, a day-long series of interactive activities aimed at local middle-school and home-schooled girls. Typical workshops may involve cyber-sleuthing, nursing, designing documents in the graphic design lab, robotics, and forensic investigation, as well as a campus wide scavenger hunt, inspiring local speakers, and a tasty lunch.

The girls must be accompanied by a parent, who is not left out of the fun - they can do the hands-on activities alongside their daughters, and also attend an informational session on career pathways and planning for educational options.

If you haven't volunteered yet at the workshop, consider going next year, and spending a delightful day playing alongside young women as they discover the world of STEM. It is also a great opportunity to hear a local scientist speak of her experiences, to meet parents and promote AAUW's interest in educating local girls.

Learning from students

Board members met with WWU Public Relations students to discuss their helping us update our social media presence. Emma Agte, Mia Steben and Chelsea Smiley, all juniors, will come up with a plan and teach us how to keep content up and running. The main purpose is to grow our membership and expand beyond Bellingham and into the county. We also hope to draw in campus members.

Throughout the process during the month of May, the students will meet with us and send drafts for comment. By the end of May, we can expect an impressive package of deliverables from a Facebook page to website updates. All will underpinned by training for AAUW members and a set-up calendar to help us maintain our new platforms. The students will also provide other products, including a media backgrounder, FAQ sheet, radio and video PSAs, a sample Instagram post and an eye-catching poster.
