AAUW members collaborate with Western students on class project

Bellingham Branch member India Nishi volunteered to work with students to ascertain ways that AAUW can forge closer ties with the student population. They developed original goals:

- to determine the level of interest of WWU students in forming an AAUW student association
- · to understand how to increase AAUW presence and awareness on campus
- · to help modernize social media and electronic communications to better reach students



A team of four students is working with India to develop surveys and focus groups to answer some of these questions. India and two of the students attended the last board meeting, where they discussed ideas such as bringing AAUW training sessions like Smart Start and Work Smart to campus, as well as "brownbag" speaker sessions. The students also asked the board to consider potential mentorships of WWU students in need of advice and guidance.

To help our branch better utilize social media tools, the students have offered to produce a handbook of instructions and guidelines. They are also working on a plan to help modernize our website, making it easier to update and maintain.
