On February 25, AAUW-Bellingham members Carol Simmer, College Relations/ Scholarship Chair, and Dr. Gerry Prody, WWU science professor, were proud to meet the two Western scholarship recipients at the 2019 WWU Scholarship Dinner held at the Wade King Student Recreation Center.

Holly Flann (second from left) is pursuing her Master of Science degree in Reptilian Physiology. She spent last summer in the Alvord Desert Basin in Oregon studying desert horned lizards for her Master's thesis. Her career goal is to work in wildlife rehabilitation, perhaps in a zoo or aquarium to aid in reptile and amphibian rehabilitation.

MacKenzie Jewell (second from right) is majoring in Physics. After graduation from WWU this year she will head to Oregon State University where she will study for her Master's degree. This summer she will be in the Beaufort Sea in Northern Alaska where she "will be diving into my research" trying to understand the sea ice dynamics in that area. After her Master's degree she hopes to obtain a PhD one day! She also said she will look into the Corvallis Branch AAUW while in Oregon.

# **Arlene Pilcher**

Long-time AAUW member Arlene Signe Pilcher, 94, of Bellingham, passed away February 25th. Born in Bellingham, the youngest of five children, to Swedish immigrants Knute and Signe Evertz, she was the last survivor among her siblings.

Arlene graduated from Bellingham High School in 1942. and regularly met for lunch with former classmates. During WWII, she joined the U.S. Navy WAVES and served for two years. She then married John C. Kowsky, Sr. and they had two children, Loriann and John "Christopher" Jr.

In 1956, she married Raymond MacDonald and moved to Wenatchee where they had children Kathryn and Scott. During her years in Wenatchee she worked at ALCOA and attended classes at Wenatchee Valley College. Ray passed away in 1976.

In 1979, Arlene married Lewis "Stephen" Pilcher. The couple moved to Bellingham, where she resumed college studies and earned a BA in Psychology from Western Washington University. She and Steve traveled widely. Arlene was a member of the Unitarian Church, a staunch Democrat, and a member of many civic organizations including AAUW, Beta Sigma Phi, Whatcom Museum Docents, and WWU Foundation.



She was preceded in death by her husband Steve in 2010, and her daughter Lori Smiley, also an AAUW member, in November of 2018.



The High School Scholars awards event will be held again this year at the Whatcom County Museum, Old City Hall Rotunda, 121 Prospect St., Bellingham.

We will need help from the Branch membership to make this another successful event. Please advise Carol Simmer or Jean Cox-Treverton by email or phone of your availability for the following needs:



- Six members for the sign-in table and to meet and greet our High School Scholars
- Two members to assist our college and university representatives and to introduce them to our scholars and their families before the event
- Volunteers to hang the AAUW banner, and place signs and tri-fold boards
- All members are asked to bring finger foods (two or three dozen "bites"). Please use disposable platters when possible, but if personal dishes are used, pleases label them with your name.
- One person to bring punch or lemonade, with ice
- Two volunteers to set up and monitor the beverage table
- Two volunteers to set up and monitor the food table
- One volunteer to work the Rotunda Room lights

Volunteers should be on site by 9 a.m., or 9:20 at the latest. The museum will have tables, chairs, speaker podium and microphone set up. Members will be needed to dress and staff tables, greet and make introductions among our guests and scholars. The museum opens to the public at noon: we are asked to have our properties on the way out by 11:45 a.m.
