Heads up for September!

Start stockpiling your \$20 bills to bring to the meeting! You can stamp them with an image of Harriet Tubman. (Yes, it's legal.)

In case you have missed this story: According to reports from the New York Times, the Washington Post, and many other news outlets, work was well underway on a new \$20 bill bearing the image of Harriet Tubman when Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin announced that the design of the note would be delayed for technical reasons by six years and might not include the former slave and abolitionist.



Many Americans were deeply disappointed with the delay of the bill, which was to be the first to bear the face of an African-American. Mr. Mnuchin, testified before Congress, saying new security features under development made the 2020 design deadline set by the Obama administration impossible to meet.

In fact, work on the new \$20 note began before Mr. Trump took office, and the basic design already on paper most likely could have satisfied the goal of unveiling a note bearing Tubman's likeness on next year's centennial of the 19th Amendment, which granted women the right to vote.

Minutes after Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said that he was delaying the new Harriet Tubman \$20 bill until 2028, a New York designer wrote, "We'll see about that." Dano Wall, 33, has created a stamp that can be used to superimpose a portrait of Tubman over Andrew Jackson's on \$20 bills.
