AAUW CEO leads list of dynamic speakers at State Meeting in Bellingham

AAUW members from around Washington gathered April 12 and 13 at the Bellingham Airport Holiday Inn for this year's State Meeting. Keynote speaker at the opening banquet was Kimberly Churches, who was named AAUW's Chief Executive Officer in 2017. She gave attendees a candid look at how she is bringing the national group's budget under tighter control.

This is the 18th year that Bellingham AAUW has honored female students selected by their high schools for excellence. In past years, recognition was in the STEM disciplines of science, technology and math. This year, we have added arts and humanities to the list (making STEAM the new acronym). Every high school in Whatcom County is invited to choose four students.

There will be 41 young women listed in the program for this year's High School Scholars Recognition Event. This means we will have a large crowd and will need a lot of help to make the day shine. **Thanks to all the members who have volunteered**. **And...don't forget...this is the one day of the year when we ask all members to bring finger foods** (two or

three dozen "bites"). Our honorees bring their families and friends, so it is a large crowd eating our treats. Please use disposable platters when possible, but if personal dishes are used, pleases label them with your name.

Volunteers and those bringing food will need to be there by at least 9:30. There is some parking behind the museum. Easiest access for those with mobility issues is the back entrance, and an elevator to the second level.



Our keynote speaker this year will be Jill MacIntyre Witt. She recently completed her Masters in Environmental Studies at WWU and is currently an instructor there in the Environmental Studies and PE departments. She is also the Peace Corps Campus Representative. Her research emphasis and passion is devoted to climate change.

State meeting

Prior to joining AAUW, Kim served as managing director of the Brookings Institution, an internationally recognized public policy think tank.

The audience consensus was that speakers for both days were top-notch.

Immigration attorneys Holly Pai of Bellingham and Leta Sanchez of Mount Vernon gave



Not only is the cost of a Green Card (which grants permanent resident status) over \$1000, there are a multitude of problems brought about by slow government processing. And, as we know, families from South America have been torn apart when they reach our southern border.

Jackie Sandemeyer, founder of TIX Education Specialists, spoke about his company's work to provide Title IX training and guidance to K-12 school districts and colleges to establish best practices and stay abreast of changing state and federal mandates. One emphasis is to be sure Title IX programs are student centered.

The final speaker was **Whatcom County's own Sharon Shewmake, recently elected State Representative from the 42nd Legislative District.** She holds a PhD in Agricultural and Natural Resource Economics, and is an associate professor at WWU, where she teaches economics and energy policy. One of the rare Democrats to have represented the 42nd District, she serves on several committees important to the Whatcom County agricultural sector.
