View a variety of themed, decorated holiday trees in the Rotunda Room, presented with the support of Museum Advocates. We will gather around our AAUW tree to hear a brief presentation from the decorating team, led by Esther Golde and her assistants, Judy Fruhbauer and Kathy Jenkis.

At 11:15, we will all need to be seated to hear the Showstoppers perform their choreographed medley entitled "Disney Dazzle" in honor of the planned BHS choir trip to Disneyland this Spring. Local poet reads her work

"I didn't know it was going to be poetry," Linda Conroy told her AAUW audience at the November meeting, "It did surprise me."

She was talking about her first steps into writing, after she retired from a career in social work. Now, she says, she writes "all the time," and no longer puts off the fun in life until after the chores are done. Fun also includes a ukulele class.

Linda was born in Birmingham, England, and her family soon moved to Nottingham (of Robin Hood fame.) They eventually emigrated to Canada. Those early years inform many of the poems in her first book of poetry, *Ordinary Signs*, which has just been published by Village Books.

On Dec. 20, at 7 pm at the Firehouse Arts Center, Linda will be part of a reading for the "Tales of the Season" which is part of Fairhaven Winterfest. Linda Conroy has graciously allowed Bellingham AAUW to print this poem, which she read at the November meeting.

I want a yellow dress to wear today, an orchestra to play my favorite melodies strong angel voices singing songs I don't remember now but liked so much before. I want to run the way I did through fields of buttercups, past eyes of cows. I want to reach to the top shelf to have the things I didn't have, to shout at those who said I couldn't have. I want to skip around the roundabout to the village shops to stop to browse and gaze at what I might have now.

I want to wander through my earlier times to notice what I didn't then, to laugh at what I never saw, and fathom what I missed before. I want to understand the girls who danced

in ballet steps, their bedrooms pink, and boys who played with catapults and didn't get in trouble if they did mean things. I want to know why I was me and they were they, and how I got here-every step-- and every wrinkle of the road every snag caught in the twist of thread rolled off the spindle that is time.

I want my pink wind-up mouse back, my building set, my fire engine with its ladders, my old red eiderdown, my first piano book, my crochet hook, my best bright paints. I want to shout and swear and make a mess, but most of all I want that yellow dress I wore when I was five and knew then, for the first time I was separate from the rest.
