In this role, Barber organizes programs to recruit and retain underrepresented faculty and students in STEM fields. She is also the Host and Executive Producer of the podcast Spark Science, featuring interviews with STEM professionals. For seven seasons, she has mentored a student production team in science communication and storytelling. Barber has spent the last decade combining racial and gender equity, science and pop culture into one career. In 2019, she won WWU's Womxn of Color Empowerment Faculty Award. She is also an alumna of the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos/ Hispanics & Native Americans in Science Leadership Institute and a former Jackson Wild Media Lab Fellow.

A volunteering adventure in Guatemala

In June, my daughter's family and I flew to Antigua, Guatemala to participate for two weeks with God's Child Project. I want to thank the very generous AAUW members for their donations of needed supplies and of gifts of money. Each family member flew with an extra suitcase filled with medical supplies, vitamins, toothbrushes and toothpaste, and children's clothing (as can be seen on the table at the Casa Jackson Hospital for Malnourished Children.)

We spent our first week building the Blue House with a cement floor for a family who had applied for the help. The families need to own their own land. Many different groups come to help build each house: the project had four different houses being built while we were there. Each group supplies the money for the materials and then the labor to build the house under the direction of the master builders provided by the Project. There were several groups of teenagers and leaders from Pennsylvania who come every year.



We stayed at a host family's home and our host prepared the local foods for our dinners.

We helped at the hospital for the second week. We were all diapering, bathing, feeding, and playing with the children. There were 27 children in the hospital and 23 mothers were there, too, to learn. We helped entertain the children while the mothers went to classes about nutrition, making good choices, etc. The average stay is two to three months for each child.

I was delighted that two of my granddaughters were able to participate with hands on to help others who are less fortunate. Thanks to your donations of money, I purchased six clean water filters to be given to families. I was delighted to be included by my family. This moving experience was rich in good feelings and great memories.
