What the College Relations/Scholarship Committee does — and how you can help!

Our Branch members are getting to know each other again after the long isolation period of the pandemic. And we have several new members to get to know! We also need to update everyone on the work of our various committees. Here is a review of the opportunities the College Relations/ Scholarship Committee has for all members.

The "Scholarship" half of the name reflects the monies given to female students in the four highereducation institutions in Whatcom County: Bellingham Technical College (BTC), Northwest Indian College (NWIC), Whatcom Community College (WCC) and Western Washington University (WWU).

An Endowment was started at WWU in the 1990s and with annual contributions (mainly by the wellknown AAUW Used Book Sale and individual contributions) by early 2000s the interest derived from the endowment balance could fund a scholarship. That fact motivated the AAUW Branch Board to focus our annual fundraising towards funding scholarships to the other three institutions. Gradually the agreements for annual scholarships to BTC, NWIC and WCC emerged. Annually the Board reviews the budget and decides on the scholarship amounts to be awarded. Currently the other three institutions each receive \$1000.00. The amount awarded by the WWU Foundation varies depending upon the interest gained in the past fiscal year. It has been between \$1000 and \$1500 for the last several years. Our Branch participates in the selection of the student awardee from WCC. The other institutions have their own scholarship selection policies that do not require our input. Criteria has been written into all agreements for all our scholarships given to every institution.

"College Relations" reflects on any and all donations given or projects initiated by every institution. We assign branch members as liaisons for each institution to learn their needs. Current activities include: Girls Go Tech at WCC; Student Food Pantries; support for High School Scholars from all institutions; providing info tables at student forums; AAUW sponsorship for the National Conference for College Women Student leaders (NCCWSL) and special assistance for an International graduate student.

You can be a part of this dynamic committee! It supports the Program and Membership committees by suggesting program ideas and speakers and by participating in activities on the campuses. We need your input and only as much time a you have to give. The committee meets from one to three times a year, but special projects need assistance sporadically. Immediately we need a liaison for WWU and one person to coordinate the Food Pantry deliveries.
