We are excited to have Dr. Melissa Rice as our guest speaker. As Dr. Rice posted on her Twitter feed: *“Lives on Earth, takes pics on Mars.”*

She is a Professor of Planetary Science at Western Washington University, and is a longtime collaborator on NASA’s Mars explorations.

Dr. Rice has held a joint appointment in the Geology Department and the Physics & Astronomy Department since 2014.

She received her Ph.D. from the Department of Astronomy at Cornell University in 2012, and was a NASA Astrobiology Institute Postdoctoral fellow at Caltech from

2012-2014. Her research focuses on the sedimentology, stratigraphy and mineralogy of Mars.

She spoke to our branch several years ago, before a lot of the ongoing Mars exploration had happened.

Egusi Soup and Fufu

AAUW members and friends had a delicious Social Studies lesson at the April meeting, compliments of WWU graduate student Tawakalt Akinjobi. With an assist from Carol Simmer, Tawakalt served us two dishes from her home country of Nigeria: Egusi Soup and Fufu. Fufu looks like mashed potatoes, but is a mixture of water and yams. The Egusi soup (more like stew in consistency) is

much more complex, containing seeds from the Egusi melon, locust beans, meat such as beef or poultry, seafood such as shrimp or crayfish, greens and a variety of peppers. Served over the Fufu, it is spicy and filling.



Tawakalt also showed slides from her native country. She is from Lagos, the largest city in Nigeria. It is a major African financial center and the economic hub of Lagos State and Nigeria at large. The city has been described as the cultural, financial, and entertainment capital of Africa.

Nigeria has 36 states, Tawakalt told us, with English being the common language. There are more than 250 ethnic groups speaking 500 distinct languages. Tawakalt was originally from Ibadan, in Oyo State, where Yoruba is spoken.

If you look closely at the photo of Tawakalt's son, AbdurRahmann, you will see a bit of his shirt, which is made from Nigerian fabric. The country is known for its textiles. Tawakalt showed us photos from some of her family

gatherings, which showcased the bright fabrics, flowing styles and unique headdresses.

Congratulations to Tawakalt, who will receive her Master's degree in Materials Chemistry in June. While studying for her degree, with a stipend from WWU, she also teaches chemistry to undergraduate students.

For the 2022 Winter quarter at WWU, Whatcom AAUW provided financial assistance to Tawakalt for child care, a much higher expense than expected when she arrived. As a "thank you" to us, she happily accepted the invitation to give a presentation for our April meeting.

AAUW Book Club discussed *Invisible Women: Exposing Data Bias in a World Designed for Men*, by Caroline Perez, at our April meeting.

I don't usually do this, but I have to give it a shout-out for being well worth reading. (It isn't as long as it looks: the last 100 pages are endnotes.)

The author doesn't slow us down with graphs, just packs in statistics and observations of women's lives around the world, and how they are overlooked when plans are being made. One example: When homes were being rebuilt after Hurricane Katrina, the all-male builders forgot to put in kitchens. Go figure.

Another example: More women are injured in car crashes because the vehicles aren't engineered to fit women, who are generally smaller than the “standard male” used for design purposes.

And medicine is even worse
