Please step up to keep the High School Scholars Event alive

We need new volunteers to help organize our High School Scholars Recognition Day in May. After many years of spearheading this, Jean Cox-Treverton, Kathy Jenkis and Carol Simmer are stepping down. They will still be ready to answer questions! Judi Edwards is leading the effort to spread out the tasks that need to be completed for a successful High School Scholars program.

We need volunteers for the following posts:

Co-Chairperson for Schools and Scholars: Beginning in February the County High Schools need to be contacted to solicit junior girls to be nominated in the STEM fields and in the ARTS and HUMANITIES. Once nominations are received, those nominated need to be contacted with a Letter of Introduction to the program event, and with a Consent Form that needs to be completed and returned. Information on the Consent Form can be used to generate an introduction to the scholar at the High School Scholars Awards. It is suggested that 2 co-chairpersons are needed to contact and work with the 12 county high schools.

Co-Chairperson for Program Speaker: Speakers in the fields noted above are those who can share their career journey with our scholars. A speaker needs to be identified and scheduled by the end of March at the latest. Any technical needs the speaker may require should be identified early if audio/visual equipment is needed at the venue where the award program will be held. The co-chairperson will be responsible for any gift/payment for the speaker as compensation and thanks for her participation in the program.

Co-Chairperson for Gift Bags: Responsible for collecting items and preparing gifts for the scholars; this section will occupy March and April in order to be ready for the May event.

Co-Chairperson for Food and Beverages: Responsible for soliciting/working with Branch members for refreshments; preparing and monitoring display of food and beverage items, and clean up after the award program. Responsibility for this section will occupy mid April until the May event.

Co-Chairperson for Documents: working with other co-chairpersons to prepare and print Certificates of Excellence, Name Tags and event Program. Responsibility for these items will occupy April through the May event.

Co-Chairperson for Miscellaneous Assistance: Responsible for helping where needed with the other Co-Chairpersons.

An update on affordable housing

The topic of our March program was affordable housing, specifically, the squeeze being put on people who live in mobile home parks.

The number of such parks is dwindling, and there are two important scenarios. In one common situation, families own their mobile home but rent the land beneath them from the park owner. The landowner is free to raise rents, defer maintenance of the grounds, or add new fees. In another situation, becoming more common, large corporations are buying the mobile home parks and redeveloping them into more lucrative uses such as commercial space for retail businesses.

This conversation is continuing during the upcoming **Whatcom Housing Week** sponsored by Whatcom Housing Alliance.

"Preserving Manufactured Housing Communities" presentation will be on October 17th 8:30-9:30 am at the Bellingham Public Library - Central Library Lecture Room. Though free, registration is requested via EventBrite.

Here is a review of the presentation:

In 2022, the City of Bellingham completed a several year strategic development process focused on the preservation of manufactured housing communities in support of maintaining local affordable housing. ROC Northwest has helped 23 manufactured home communities within Washington State become resident owned communities (ROC), giving those residents the opportunity to realize affordable housing security. Through this program, residents incorporate as a limited equity housing cooperative, obtaining financing, and purchase the parcel of real estate where their homes are located. This session highlights the collaboration of COB with ROC Northwest in the development of the recently adopted protective overlay zone and supporting regulations for manufactured housing parks within Bellingham. This event features the following panel:

Gender Pay Gap data reveals little progress

September 12, 2023 Despite antidiscrimination laws being in place for six decades, new data reveals a troubling standstill in closing the gender pay gap.

Women still earn just 84% of what men do, and for specific groups of women, the situation is even more dire.

Looking closer at specific groups of women, AAUW found even more startling inequities, compared to the pay of white, non-Hispanic men:

Latina women workers are paid 52 cents for every dollar

Black women workers are paid 66 cents for every dollar

White women workers are paid 74 cents for every dollar

Asian American women workers are paid 89 cents for every dollar
