November meeting -

It's okay to say "Queer" again!

You can't know Michelle Harmeier, Ed.D., for more than five minutes without realizing that this person is a mover and shaker. Michelle is the founder of the Bellingham Queer Collective.

They retired from a career in teaching and school administration in July, 2021, and moved from California to Bellingham with their partner. In only a year and a half, they started the Bellingham Queer Collective, which "connects, celebrates, unites and advocates for the LGBTQ+ and BIPOC communities" north of Seattle.

Michelle relates that use of the word "queer" was hard for her to accept, because it has been used as a pejorative for so long. But, younger people in the LGBTQ+ community want to reclaim the word, and own it. BQC has quickly grown to over 700 members.

The group sponsors a variety of events, such as movie nights, dances and interest groups. They also support local gay-owned businesses. Michelle says that in California, there are LGBTQ+ resource centers, but they found nothing like that exists in this area. To that end, BQC is working toward a brick-and-mortar community center in Bellingham.
