The Red Dress is no longer at the LaConner Quilt and Textile Museum, but the museum always has remarkable shows. The Red Dress project was conceived by British artist Kirstie Macleod, providing an artistic platform for people from all over the world, many of whom are vulnerable and/or live in poverty, to tell their stories through embroidery.

From 2009 to 2022, pieces of The Red Dress and later the completed garment travelled the globe being embroidered upon. Constructed out of 87 panels of burgundy silk dupion, the dress has been worked on by 367 women/girls, 11 men/boys and two non-binary artists from 51 countries.
